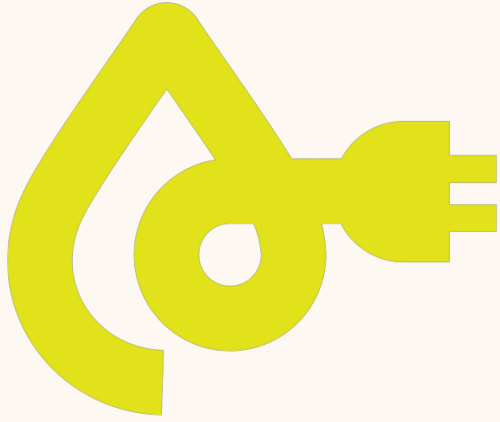




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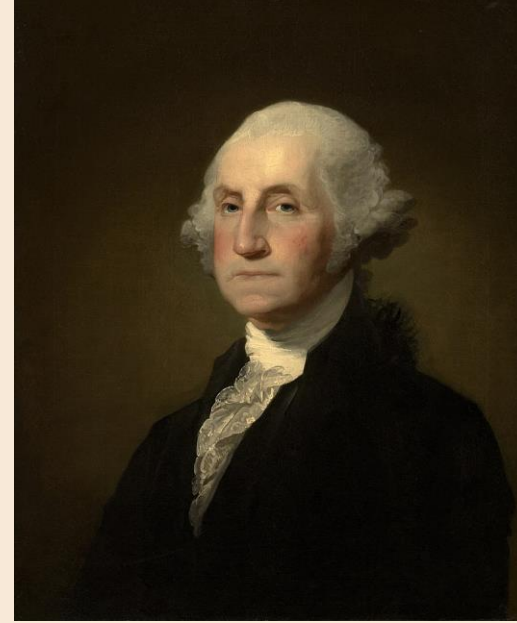
Which U.S. Presidents were

Abraham Lincoln

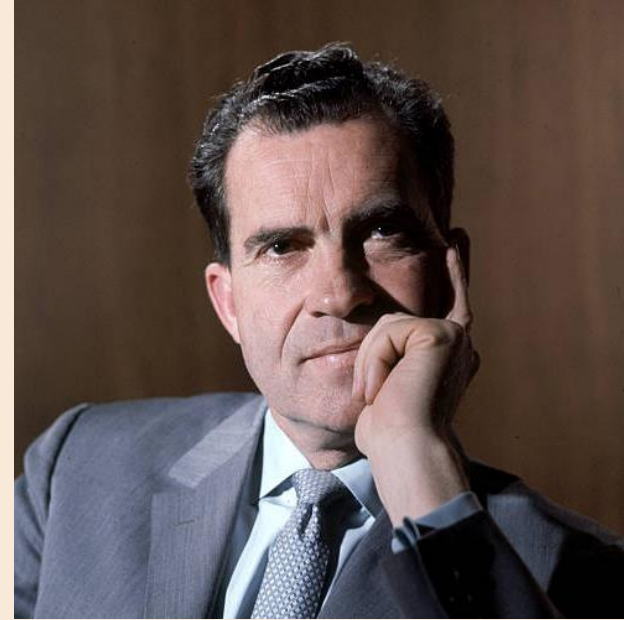


Despite being embroiled in the effort to save the Union, in support of American farmers, Lincoln managed to establish the Department of Agriculture. He also provided funding for agricultural colleges and his Yosemite Grant protected what we know today as Yosemite National Park.

Love him or hate him, Richard Nixon passed seminal legislation (the National Environmental Policy Act) which stands as the foundation for many of our environmental protections.

Richard Nixon



President Nixon was responsible for creating the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Clean Air Act which required the EPA to create and enforce air pollution standards.

Johnson became president following the Kennedy assassination. He served one full term, opting not to run for re-election. Despite his limited tenure, he accomplished a great deal for the environment.

Lyndon Johnson



During his tenure, Lyndon Johnson enacted the Wilderness Act (1964) the Land and Water Conservation Act (1965), the Endangered Species Preservation Act (1966), and the National Trails System Act (1968)

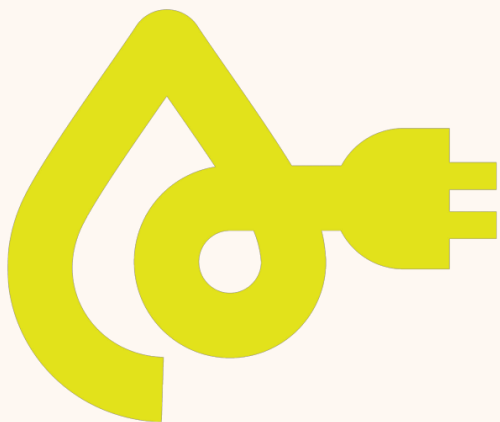

Teddy Roosevelt



For Teddy Roosevelt, environmental affairs were a top priority. He established the Antiquities Act which gave presidents the authority to make federal lands national monuments, created 50 wildlife refuges, five national parks, set aside 150 million acres of timberland, and helped develop the U.S. Forest Service.



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
